**ACCOMPLISHMENTS:**

**DATA** – In the process of creating a separate data memo that directly addresses Disproportionate Minority Contact (DMC).

**ATD** – Requested and received funding from the Crime Commission to pursue crisis response service for youth on Probation. This service will be available to youth who are not willing to return home and/or a parent not willing to retrieve youth from DCYC. This in-home service can be accessed at the point of intake.

**DMC**- The Center for Children’s Law and Policy provided a training in April for system leaders and a second training last month for front-line staff. The CCLP training addressed Disproportionate Minority Contact and Reducing Ethnic and Racial Disparities. The DMC team is developing a final training that will be in the community to assist families in understanding how they can affect DMC in our county.

**Case Processing**- The committee is working towards receiving technical assistance from the Annie E Casey Foundation for case processing. The JDAI Collaborative will vote on this issue in September for final approval to proceed. The group has also completed a data review related to pre-detention hearing staff calls. The review indicates that when attorneys do not participate in the calls, youth tend to remain detained for approximately ten days longer than their counterparts.
