## **Runaway Taskforce Purpose Statement**

The Purpose of the Runaway Taskforce is two-fold:

- Prevent youth who are exhibiting runaway risk factors and behaviors from entering the juvenile justice system, by ensuring that appropriate community resources exist and meet the needs of youth.
- Ensure the justice system is effective, compassionate and empowers youth and their families to succeed while building an environment of mutual trust and accountability.

  - Guest Speaker-Lakeisha Phelps
    - Spoke to the group
    - Group discussion:
      - We need to allow kinship relationships to matter.
      - Is a group home better than a youth center?
        - In group homes they focus on behavior.
        - In shelters it was better because they tried to get past the behavior to the core of the problem.
      - This group's focus is on the middle school age range; how do we engage them to discover the reason they are running? If they're not system-involved, what do we do with them?
        - o If they run they need to have a safe place to go; shelters are a good place
      - A lot of times these youth have no one they can trust or depend on. That would make a huge difference if they had some kind of support system, someone they can trust and talk to.
      - There are some good foster parents out there, but there are quite a few who continue the mistreatment the youth have been experiencing. Often, the youth are not believed when they try to report the mistreatment.
      - We don't do a good job of evaluating the services we are recommending for these youth.
      - Youth are being re-victimized for being a victim.
      - What is available for running youth, when the home environment is the reason they are running and we don't want them to become system involved? What are our options? Shelters, churches?
